As a brave young mother battles a rare form of cancer

Kathy shares her

WHEN Kathy Seiffert was began writing an online diary, or blog, to share her emotional journey with fam-

Now her selfless approach to survival has become one of her greatest gifts.

On September 24, 2006, Kathy's son Lachlan arrived six weeks early. A month later, a routine pap smear revealed that the new mother had cervical cancer.

A radical hysterectomy uncovered something even worse: the extremely rare primary peritoneal cancer. Only 160 Australians are diagnosed with the illness each year. Just days before her 30th birthday, Kathy was given only six months to live.

Six months to be a mother a wife and a friend while battling sickness, grief, disbelief and even guilt for the pain her illness was causing others. Amid this cacophony of emotions, the plucky former jockey began preparing to say

goodbye and wrote in a bid to make sense of it all. "The online blog started off as a way to keep people in-



formed about what was going on so that it didn't turn into a case of Chinese whispers,'

JANUARY 30, 2008

I've had a few people comment to me lately that they hear I am in remission and as much as I would love this to be true, unfortunately it isn't

I decided I wasn't ready yet . . . sorry LOL. Poor Mark was told by the doctors to ring

everyone and I will never be able to understand how hard that was for him to do. It absolutely broke my heart to see everyone suffer like that - don't worry about me, I was dosed up on painkillers. Thank you for telling me I could go ... I had read that in so many books but until I had it said to me by the people who are closest to me, I really didn't understand what sort of impact that did make on you. At the end of the night I guess it really wasn't my time yet

. I know you say I shouldn't

be saying this but I am so

sorry to put you all through that night. As horrible as it was for all of us I saw in this weekend everyone's eyes how much they loved me and that meant

the world to me. Kathv's cancer has now reached the palliative stage, and she is determined to stav at home for as long as possible and continue to defy the odds. There are still regular hospital trips, including one this week which delivered another dose of dreaded chemo.

"There's supposed to be a new treatment out next year for this type of cancer but it's still at the trial stage, so I've basically told my doctors to use me as a guinea pig and try whatever drugs they like to not only slow the cancer down but to help future patients," she says.

"If there's something they want to have a shot at, I've said just do it.'

Yesterday Lachlan turned four and his brave mum wasn't going to miss it for the world. When she was first diagnosed with cancer, Kathy, Mark and Lachlan decorated a birthday plate

and they're planning to use it

"People are saying that my experience and my blog has made them re-evaluate their life and realise what's import ant and what's not, and this is good for me because I always look for a reason behind why I'm going through this and this sort of at least gives me one," Kathy says.

"If it makes people appreciate their lives more, then at least it's helped in some
